

UMS PRESENTS PING CHONG + COMPANY'S BEYOND SACRED: VOICES OF MUSLIM IDENTITY

Residency to Include Free Community Events

ANN ARBOR, MI (January 30, 2017) — The **University Musical Society** (UMS) will present **Ping Chong + Company**'s production *Beyond Sacred: Voices of Muslim Identity* on Saturday, February 18 at 8 pm in Arbor's Power Center (121 Fletcher St, Ann Arbor, MI 48109). In addition to the performance, which will also be livestreamed, UMS will host a number of related community events; full details listed below. *Beyond Sacred*, part of Chong's 25-year series entitled *Undesirable Elements*, intends to illuminate daily experiences of Muslims, and work toward greater communication and understanding among Muslim and non-Muslim communities.

The interview-based theater production explores the diverse experiences of five young Muslim New Yorkers who share the common experience of coming of age in a post-9/11 New York City, at a time of increasing Islamophobia. Participants come from a range of cultural and ethnic backgrounds and include men and women that reflect a wide range of Muslim identities, including those who have converted to Islam; those who were raised Muslim, but have since left the faith; those who identify as "secular" or "culturally" Muslim; and those who are observant on a daily basis.

"We initially programmed Ping Chong's work for our 2016-17 season over a year ago. But with recent events and protests, it is especially timely now," said UMS President Ken Fischer. "We are proud to be presenting *Beyond Sacred*, which spotlights five different Muslim voices at a time of rising Islamophobia. And we believe so strongly in this work, especially at this time, that we are going to livestream the performance, to make it more broadly accessible to a larger population, even outside of Southeast Michigan. Our staff has worked hard to put together a series of additional events, including a day-long immersion into understanding Islam, class visits to four different University of Michigan schools that are including the performance in their curriculum, in-depth residencies with local high school students, and a free community forum on Islam held the day before the performance, to help provide additional context to the urgent conversation on these issues."

Ping Chong is an American contemporary theater director, playwright, choreographer, and video and installation artist whose multimedia productions examine cultural and ethnic differences and pressing social issues of the moment. He is best known for his series *Undesirable Elements*, an ongoing exploration of the experience of outsiders that is recrafted for each city in which it is performed. Drawing on documentary and interview-based materials, over 40 different versions have been performed in communities all over the United States, Europe, and in Japan. Chong has been the recipient of numerous honors, including an Obie Award for Sustained Achievement (2000), the Doris Duke Artist Award for Theatre (2013), and the National Medal of Arts (2014), presented by President Barack Obama.

Established with the generous support of alumna Penny W. Stamps, the Speaker Series brings respected innovators from a broad spectrum of fields to the School to conduct a public lecture and engage with students, faculty, and the larger U-M and Ann Arbor communities.
