

# **UMS ANNOUNCES 2017-18 SEASON**

# 139<sup>TH</sup> SEASON CONTINUES LONGSTANDING TRADITION OF ARTISTIC EXCELLENCE AND GROUNDBREAKING PERFORMANCES

# NEW YORK PHILHARMONIC RETURNS FOR A THREE-CONCERT WEEKEND AND ORCHESTRAL RESIDENCY

ANN ARBOR, MI (April 14, 2017) – The **University Musical Society** (UMS) announces its 2017-18 season, which runs from September 2017 through April 2018. The season features 66 live performances by 43 different artists and ensembles; a schedule of HD theater broadcasts will be announced later. In addition to presenting world-class performances, UMS is also committed to creating unique and engaging ways for audiences to connect with the artists on stage through a robust offering of education and community engagement activities.

This 139<sup>th</sup> season will be incoming UMS president Matthew VanBesien's inaugural season. VanBesien, who has served as president of the New York Philharmonic since 2012, will take the reins from Kenneth C. Fischer, who retires at the end of June after 30 years in the job. He will become only the seventh president in UMS's history.

UMS's orchestral residency program will continue as the **New York Philharmonic** returns for three public performances at **Hill Auditorium**. The concert programs will focus on Leonard Bernstein, the celebrated New York Philharmonic music director and composer who was born 100 years ago. On **Friday, November 17 at 8 pm, Jaap van Zweden** will lead the orchestra in a performance of **Mahler**'s **Symphony No. 5**. The orchestra will perform a special **Young People's Concert** on **Saturday, November 18 at 2 pm** with Detroit Symphony Orchestra music director **Leonard Slatkin** at the helm. The weekend closes with **Leonard Slatkin** leading the orchestra in a concert that features **Richard Strauss's Don Quixote** and **Bernstein's Symphony No. 3 ("Kaddish")**. A subscription package that includes all three

performances is available. Full details about related educational activities will be announced this fall.

#### 139<sup>TH</sup> ANNUAL CHORAL UNION SERIES

Within the signature Choral Union Series, UMS presents 11 concerts in historic Hill Auditorium.

- UMS's 139<sup>th</sup> Choral Union Series launches with pianist Daniil Trifonov's UMS recital debut. The
  26-year old performed for UMS audiences in 2016 with the Montreal Symphony Orchestra and
  returns on Wednesday, October 25 at 7:30 pm with a recital program that explores Chopin and
  other composers he inspired, including Tchaikovsky, Rachmaninoff, and Mompou.
- The China National Center for the Performing Arts Orchestra will make its UMS debut on Tuesday, November 7 at 7:30 pm with a new work commissioned by Qigang Chen, the music director of the 2008 Summer Olympics. Also on the program is American composer Lou Harrison's pipa concerto featuring the world's reigning pipa virtuoso and Silk Road Ensemble member, Wu Man. This performance is also on UMS's Traditions & Crosscurrents Series.
- The New York Philharmonic returns to Ann Arbor for their second major UMS orchestral residency, including three public performances that celebrate the beloved New York Philharmonic music director and composer Leonard Bernstein. Jaap van Zweden leads the orchestra in a performance of Mahler's Symphony No. 5 on Friday, November 17 at 8 pm. On Sunday, November 19 at 3 pm, they perform Richard Strauss's Don Quixote and Bernstein's Symphony No. 3 ("Kaddish") with Detroit Symphony Orchestra music director Leonard Slatkin at the helm. The third concert, a recreation of Bernstein's Young People's Concert, is not on the Choral Union Series but is available as part of the New York Philharmonic Weekend Package.
- On Friday, December 8 at 8 pm, conductor and music director Masaaki Suzuki will lead the Bach Collegium Japan in a performance of Johann Sebastian Bach's Christmas Oratorio.
   Founded by Suzuki in 1990, the ensemble performed Bach's full list of more than 200 church cantatas in chronological order between 1995 and 2013, including two performances in Ann

Arbor. This performance is also on UMS's Choral Music Series.

- Violinist Maxim Vengerov returns for his first UMS recital in nearly 20 years on Sunday, January
   28 at 4 pm. Pianist Roustem Saïtkoulov will accompany Vengerov on a program featuring works
   by Schubert, Beethoven, Ravel, Ysaÿe, Ernst, and Paganini.
- Former Detroit Symphony Orchestra music director Neeme Järvi returns to Southeast Michigan on Saturday, February 3 at 8 pm with the Estonian National Symphony Orchestra. Järvi will lead the orchestra in its UMS debut with a program steeped in the music of Estonian composers, including Eduard Tubin's Symphony No. 5 and Heino Eller's Dawn. Garrick Ohlsson joins the orchestra for Brahms's Piano Concerto No. 1.
- Violinist Joshua Bell returns for a UMS recital performance on Saturday, February 10 at 8 pm accompanied by pianist Sam Haywood. The program will be announced at a later date.
- On Saturday, February 17 at 7:30 pm UMS and the University of Michigan's School of Music,
  Theatre & Dance (SMTD) will present the University of Michigan's Gershwin Initiative's scholarly
  edition of George and Ira Gershwin's Porgy and Bess. Kenneth Kiesler will lead the U-M School
  of Music, Theatre, & Dance Choruses and University Symphony Orchestra in the performance
  of this landmark score. In addition to the concert, UMS and SMTD will host related symposia and
  other educational activities as part of an ongoing scholarly examination of the art of George and
  Ira Gershwin.
- On Sunday, April 15 at 4 pm, Jeannette Sorrell will lead Apollo's Fire / The Cleveland Baroque Orchestra in a semi-staged concert version of Monteverdi's L'Orfeo. The concert will be performed in Italian with English supertitles and feature period dancers. The role of Orfeo will be performed by tenor Karim Sulayman, with soprano Erica Schuller performing the role of Eurydice.

Pianist Murray Perahia returns with a recital performance on Sunday, April 22 at 4 pm. The
performance marks his 13<sup>th</sup> UMS appearance since his debut over 40 years ago. The program
will be announced at a later date.

### 55<sup>TH</sup> ANNUAL CHAMBER ARTS SERIES

The 55<sup>th</sup> Annual Chamber Arts Series includes eight concerts by nine of today's leading chamber ensembles performing both traditional and contemporary repertoire. The concerts all take place in **Rackham Auditorium**.

- On Thursday, October 5 at 7:30 pm members of the Calidore String Quartet, the inaugural M-Prize winner who made their UMS debut in February, will join their mentors, the Emerson String Quartet, in a program that features works for larger string ensembles. The program includes works by Bruckner, Shostakovich, Mendelssohn, and Richard Strauss.
- In celebration of the 20th anniversary of the Sphinx Organization, the Sphinx Virtuosi will perform a special program that offers a collection of concerti through the ages on Sunday,
   October 29 at 4 pm. The program will feature beloved masterpieces by Vivaldi, Beethoven, and Vaughan Williams as well as new works by Michael Abels and Jimmy López. The group's 18-members are all alumni of the Sphinx Competition, which supports racial diversity in classical music.
- On Sunday, November 12 at 4 pm, the Israeli mandolin virtuoso Avi Avital and Syrian clarinetist
  and composer Kinan Azmeh will team up with The Knights and Silk Road Ensemble violinist
  Colin Jacobsen for an extraordinary performance grounded in the classical tradition and crossing
  boundaries into the worlds of Middle Eastern, Balkan, klezmer, and jazz. This performance is
  also on UMS's Traditions & Crosscurrents Series.
- The St. Lawrence String Quartet will perform a Haydn mega-concert on Sunday, January 14 at 2 pm. In this immersive concert, the quartet will perform all six of Haydn's Op. 20 string quartets, with two intermissions (including a meal break).

- Flutist Emmanuel Pahud makes his UMS debut recital performance on Wednesday, February 14 at 7:30 pm, accompanied by pianist Alessio Bax. The program includes arrangements of sonatas written for other instruments by Mozart, Schubert, Schumann, and Mendelssohn, allowing audiences to experience the works from a completely different soundscape.
- On Sunday, March 11 at 4 pm the Elias Quartet will perform a program that explores how
  composers after Beethoven lived up to his monumental legacy. This particular program will
  focus on the work of Schubert (Quartettsatz and Quartet No. 14) and Dvořák (Quartet No. 14).
- The Artemis Quartet will perform Mozart's Quartet No. 23, Bartók's Quartet No. 2, and
   Schumann's Quartet on Sunday, April 8 at 4 pm.
- The grand prize winner of the University of Michigan School of Music, Theatre & Dance's M-Prize will be featured on the UMS Chamber Arts series. The ensemble will be identified at the M-Prize finals on May 4, and a date for their UMS concert announced in late June. M-Prize is an international chamber arts competition for ensembles of up to eight musicians all under the age of 40. Details will be posted at ums.org as soon as a date is determined for the winning ensemble's UMS appearance.

#### **INTERNATIONAL THEATER SERIES**

This year's International Theater Series features three productions, which will unfold in the **Power**Center for the Performing Arts and the Arthur Miller Theatre.

- Paines Plough and Pentabus Theatre Company's production of Every Brilliant Thing will run
  Tuesday, September 12 through Sunday, September 17 in the Arthur Miller Theatre. Starring
  Jonny Donahoe, Every Brilliant Thing is a new play about depression and the lengths we will go
  to for those we love.
- Théâtre de la Ville will bring Albert Camus's L'État de siege (State of Siege) to the Power Center on Friday, October 13 and Saturday, October 14 at 8 pm. The play takes place in a nightmarish future city that is reduced to the silence and submission of authority under the leadership of a character called "Le Peste" (The Plague). The Plague brings order, administration,

lists, records, statistics, and persecution — until a young man, Diego, organizes a revolt. Written in 1948, *State of Siege* takes place in Cádiz, Spain and reflects the creation of a corrupt, totalitarian regime and the necessity of resistance. This production is directed by **Emmanuel Demarcy-Mota** and will be performed in French with English supertitles.

Cold Blood, a show by Michèle Anne De Mey, Jaco Van Dormael, and The Collectif Kiss and Cry,
will run Thursday, April 19 through Saturday, April 21 in the Power Center. With a hypnotic
story laced with offbeat humor, the production combines film, dancing fingers, music, and
theater to explore the uncertain, yet inevitable, last moments we experience before we die. This
performance is also part of UMS Renegade.

In addition to these events, UMS will present *No Safety Net: Theater for Unsafe Conversations in Safe Spaces*, a three-week series featuring three stage productions that embrace the long theatrical legacy of both intervening in pressing social issues and drawing diverse voices into the conversation. Titles and a full schedule of related residency activities will be announced in the fall. *No Safety Net* will run from January 17-February 4, 2018.

#### **27<sup>TH</sup> ANNUAL DANCE SERIES**

The UMS Dance Series includes five performances at the **Power Center for the Performing Arts** and the **Detroit Opera House**.

• Ragamala Dance Company will perform *Written in Water* on Friday, October 20 at 8 pm at the Power Center. In *Written in Water*, co-artistic directors Ranee and Aparna Ramaswamy explore the concept of spiritual ascension through the 2nd-century Indian board game *Paramapadam* (upon which Snakes & Ladders is based), the 12th century Sufi text *The Conference of the Birds*, and the Hindu mythological story *Ksheerabthi Madanam*. The performance unfolds upon large-scale paintings by Chennai-based visual artist **Keshav**, projected on the stage floor. Dancers activate the space by negotiating snakes and ladders, representing the heights of ecstasy and the depths of longing in Hindu and Sufi thought. The live music for *Written in Water* is composed and performed by **Amir ElSaffar**, interwoven with original South Indian Carnatic compositions by **Prema Ramamurthy**. This performance is also on UMS's Traditions & Crosscurrents Series.

- Urban Bush Women will perform Hair & Other Stories on Friday, January 12 at 8 pm at the
  Power Center. Hair & Other Stories is a multidisciplinary evening-length work that addresses
  matters of race, gender identity, and economic inequality through the lens of hair, primarily that
  of African-American women.
- American Ballet Theatre will bring its signature production of *Romeo & Juliet*, featuring choreography by Kenneth MacMillan and the music of Sergei Prokofiev, to the Detroit Opera House Thursday, February 8 through Sunday, February 11. UMS and Michigan Opera Theatre co-present American Ballet Theatre as part of an extended partnership to bring dance to southeastern Michigan. Casting will be announced at a later date. UMS will provide round-trip luxury coach service for a nominal fee on Thursday and Friday.
- Company Wang Ramirez will perform *Borderline* on Friday, March 9 and Saturday, March 10 at 8 pm at the Power Center. In *Borderline*, six dancers, including co-founders and choreographers Honji Wang and Sébastien Ramirez, toy with the forces of gravity. Through a subtle and sophisticated use of rigging they will create a powerful evening of breathtaking movement, physical energy, and spiritual serenity. The production features original music by Jean-Philippe Barrios (aka Lacrymoboy).
- Nederlands Dans Theater comes to the Power Center with two performances on Friday, March 23 and Saturday, March 24 at 8 pm. The program includes "The Statement" by Crystal Pite, as well as Sol León and artistic director Paul Lightfoot's "Shoot the Moon" and "Singulière Odyssée." "Shoot the Moon" is a heartbreaking view of three different love stories deteriorating behind closed doors in a revolving set of three rooms, set to music by Philip Glass. "The Statement" features two men and two women dealing with a conflict in a boardroom setting, with Jonathan Young (from the 2016-17 season's Betroffenheit) providing the script/score. This performance is also part of UMS Renegade.

## 24<sup>TH</sup> ANNUAL JAZZ SERIES

With five concerts in various venues, the UMS Jazz Series celebrates the diversity of jazz, highlighting contemporary trailblazers while honoring jazz's legacy.

- Zakir Hussain, a living master of the 3,000-year-old tabla percussion tradition, and distinguished bassist and 2017 NEA Jazz Master Dave Holland will perform on Wednesday, November 1 at 7:30 pm at the Michigan Theater. The program will explore the many directions of inspiration between the idioms of jazz and Indian music and will feature Shankar Mahadevan, Chris Potter, Sanjay Divecha, Louiz Banks, and Eric Harland. This performance is also on UMS's Traditions & Crosscurrents Series.
- Two of the world's foremost improvising artists, guitarists John McLaughlin and Jimmy Herring will perform on Wednesday, November 15 at 7:30 pm at the Michigan Theater. After separate sets by the two headliners with their own bands, they join forces for an expansive closing jam, revisiting the pioneering music that McLaughlin introduced in the 1970s with his deeply influential, genre-defying Mahavishnu Orchestra. This tour marks the 75-year-old McLaughlin's first extensive US tour in seven years and his last American performances.
- On Saturday, March 17 at 9 pm, composer and saxophonist Steve Lehman will take the stage with his international ensemble Sélébéyone, which includes rappers HPrizm, a legend of New York's underground hip-hop scene, and Gaston Bandimic, one of Senegal's most distinctive young rap stars, with a unique hybrid performance that juxtaposes English and Wolof against changing meters and asymmetrical rhythms. This concert will take place at El Club (4114 Vernor Highway, Detroit). This performance is also on UMS's Traditions & Crosscurrents Series and is part of UMS Renegade.
- The Jazz at Lincoln Center Orchestra will return to Hill Auditorium on Saturday, March 31 at 8
   pm, this time with jazz pianist and NEA Jazz Master Chick Corea at the helm.
- Two of South Africa's iconic jazz legends, pianist Abdullah Ibrahim and trumpeter Hugh Masekela, will reunite on Friday, April 13 at 8 pm at the Michigan Theater to perform on the same stage for the first time in 56 years. They come together for a historic concert to tell the story of The Jazz Epistles, the first all-black jazz group in South Africa and arguably the most important jazz (bebop) recording in the country's history. - Composer, trumpeter, santur player, and vocalist Amir ElSaffar's Rivers of Sound will come to the Power Center on Wednesday, October 18 at 7:30 pm. Rivers of Sound presents 17 musicians from Western and Middle Eastern traditions, from Iraqi maqam to American jazz, creating a unique microtonal musical environment that moves beyond the notions of style and tradition into a realm of sound that includes both improvised and composed material. ElSaffar and select members of the group also provide the live music for Ragamala Dance Company's Written in Water two nights later.
- Power Center. In Written in Water, co-artistic directors Ranee and Aparna Ramaswamy explore the concept of spiritual ascension through the 2nd-century Indian board game Paramapadam (upon which Snakes & Ladders is based), the 12th century Sufi text The Conference of the Birds, and the Hindu mythological story Ksheerabthi Madanam. The performance unfolds upon large-scale paintings by Chennai-based visual artist Keshav, projected on the stage floor. The performance combines music with projected film, new and archival photography, and the stories of those few musical elders who are still keeping the rapidly vanishing folkloric tradition of the Piedmont Blues, a product of the Atlantic Coastal Plain and the Appalachian Mountains, alive. The production makes a testimony of the struggle endured by African Americans in the Southeast during Jim Crow and chronicles the efficacy of the Piedmont Blues as a salve for suffering.
- On Saturday, March 17 at 9 pm, composer and saxophonist Steve Lehman will take the stage with his international ensemble Sélébéyone, which includes rappers HPrizm, a legend of New York's underground hip-hop scene, and Gaston Bandimic, one of Senegal's most distinctive young rap stars, with a unique hybrid performance that juxtaposes English and Wolof against changing meters and asymmetrical rhythms. #### **CHORAL MUSIC SERIES**

The UMS Choral Music Series includes four performances at Hill Auditorium and St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church:

- Chanticleer will perform at Hill Auditorium on Friday, November 10 at 8 pm. The Grammy
  Award-winning ensemble, which celebrates its 40th season in 2017-18, is known around the
  world for the seamless blend of its 12 male voices, ranging from soprano to bass, as well as its
  original interpretations of vocal literature that run the gamut from Gregorian chant to jazz and
  popular genres.
- The Grammy Award-winning UMS Choral Union and the Ann Arbor Symphony Orchestra's annual performance of Handel's Messiah will be presented on Saturday, December 2 at 8 pm and Sunday, December 3 at 2 pm at Hill Auditorium. This tradition dates back to the organization's founding and first concerts in the 1879-80 season. Choral Union music director Scott Hanoian will conduct. Soloists will be announced at a later date.
- On Friday, December 8 at 8 pm at Hill Auditorium, conductor and music director Masaaki
   Suzuki will lead the Bach Collegium Japan in a performance of Johann Sebastian Bach's
   Christmas Oratorio. Founded by Suzuki in 1990, the ensemble performed Bach's full list of more than 200 church cantatas in chronological order between 1995 and 2013, including two performances in Ann Arbor. This performance is also on UMS's 139<sup>th</sup> Annual Choral Union

#### Series.

• Tenebrae will team up with the University of Michigan Chamber Choir to perform Joby Talbot's Path of Miracles at St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church on Tuesday, March 13 at 7:30 pm. Talbot's composition — the first major work commissioned by the ensemble — is based on the most enduring route of Catholic pilgrimage, the great Pilgrimage to Santiago, and the four movement titles are the four main posts along the route (Roncevalles, Burgos, León, and Santiago). Path of Miracles incorporates medieval texts and Roman Catholic liturgy and is sung in Greek, Latin, Spanish, Basque, French, English, and German.

#### **UMS SONG REMIX: A BIENNIAL SONGFEST**

The UMS Song Remix looks at a collision of song practice with four performances in **Lydia Mendelssohn**Theatre.

- Pianist Martin Katz will curate a special performance that examines the components of a song
  on Saturday, January 6 at 8 pm. This second edition of What's in a Song will highlight Katz's
  inimitable knowledge of the vast song repertoire and feature a cast of soloists that will be
  announced at a later date.
- Soprano and University of Michigan alumna Janai Brugger makes her UMS recital debut on
  Wednesday, January 31 at 7:30 pm accompanied by Martin Katz. Brugger, who has quickly
  become one of the Metropolitan Opera's go-to singers with four roles this past season, won the
  Kennedy Center's 2016 Marian Anderson Vocal Award and was identified by *Opera News* as one
  of their top 25 "brilliant young artists" in 2015.
- Gabriel Kahane will perform his new production *Book of Travelers* on Friday, February 2 at 8 pm. The highly anticipated follow-up to his acclaimed stage piece, *The Ambassador*, Kahane's *Book of Travelers* offers an expansive exploration of American history, regionalism, and the history of travel itself, all couched in a collection of songs as personal as any Kahane has written.
- Tenor lan Bostridge will perform Schubert's Winterreise on Sunday, February 4 at 4 pm with pianist Julius Drake. A former historian, Bostridge has also written a book, Schubert's Winter

*Journey: Anatomy of an Obsession*, that explores this song cycle, which takes listeners on a journey across a landscape of lost love.

#### **ADDITIONAL EVENTS**

- UMS will bring the Big Easy to Downtown Home & Garden and Bill's Beer Garden on Friday, September 8 at 8 pm with a season-opening event featuring Butler, Bernstein & the Hot 9. Led by retro-futurist brass man Steven Bernstein and New Orleans pianist and singer Henry Butler, the ensemble embodies New Orleans tradition and early 20th-century blues.
- As a part of their three-concert orchestral residency, the New York Philharmonic will perform a Young People's Concert on Saturday, November 18 at 2 pm at Hill Auditorium. Detroit Symphony Orchestra music director Leonard Slatkin takes the helm for this special hour-long celebration of Leonard Bernstein which, though titled a "Young People's Concert," will be appreciated and enjoyed by audiences of all ages.
- Writer and street performer Nick Cassenbaum joins forces with an ensemble of klezmer musicians in Bubble Schmeisis, a theatrical piece that will run Thursday, March 22 through Sunday, March 25 at The Schvitz in Detroit (8295 Oakland Street), one of the country's few remaining traditional bath houses, which has been in operation for over 85 years. Bubble Schmeisis is full of intimate and personal true stories about identity, home, and getting schmeised (washed) by old men.
- Virtuoso saxophonist Colin Stetson will perform Sorrow A Reimagining of Górecki's Third Symphony at the Michigan Theater on Saturday, April 14 at 8 pm. Henryk Górecki's iconic third symphony's three movements are centered around three laments, each focused in some way about a child being taken away from a mother. Stetson takes on the mammoth task of reimagining Górecki's symphony for an expansive and contemporary sonic palate with an imaginative new interpretation that draws on a uniquely constructed 12-member ensemble

employing electric guitars, synthesizers, drums, strings, woodwinds, and soprano.
